Maricopa County Community College District (MCCCD) Tempe, Arizona


The Chief Information Officer (CIO) reports directly to the Chief Operating Officer, is a member of the Chancellor's Executive Council, and is the most senior executive officer responsible for providing leadership and direction to the units of the Information Technology Services (ITS) division. The CIO is responsible for system-wide planning, budgeting, security, and coordination and integration of the information technology systems and resources that support MCCCD's business, academic, and student goals.

Maricopa County Community College District

Maricopa County Community College District (MCCCD) is one of the nation's largest and most innovative community college systems. Popularly known as Maricopa Community Colleges, the District is comprised of 10 individually accredited colleges and 31 satellite locations serving approximately 100,000 students and employing over 10,000 faculty and staff.

Since its founding in 1962, the Maricopa Community Colleges system has continued to be an essential resource for local communities in the Greater Phoenix Metro Area and a gateway to affordable higher education, particularly for disadvantaged, diverse, and first-generation students. It offers over 600 associate degree and certificate programs and will begin offering baccalaureate degrees in the Fall 2023 semester. Its transfer agreements with more than 40 university partners, including Arizona's public state universities, simplify the process for students wishing to continue their education at a four-year institution, making it an economical and popular option.





The Maricopa Community Colleges have long supported the development of civic values necessary for democracy to thrive. Motivated by our commitment to a diverse and inclusive democracy, undergirded by the principles of free speech and academic freedom essential to institutions of higher education, we undertake various efforts to educate our students, employees, and community in these areas

Local and state business leaders and Fortune 500 companies partner with Maricopa Community Colleges as a driving force for economic development and prosperity in Arizona. Maricopa Community Colleges, the leader in Arizona career training, continues to add new programs to reflect the changing industry landscape and create new opportunities for students. It recently added indemand career programs like artificial intelligence, cybersecurity, cannabis business training, and unmanned aircraft systems. As the workforce evolves, MCCCD works diligently to create new programs that reflect the changing industry landscape, preparing our students with skills to stay ahead of the curve.

- Artificial Intelligence (AI), is a first-of-its-kind certificate and degree program in Arizona, focusing on AI (including business solutions and other applications), natural language processing, computer vision, computer programming (Python), machine learning, math, engineering, and statistics.
- **Cannabis Business Training**, offers high-quality cannabis and CBD training and instruction for dispensary owners and professionals
- **Construction Trades**, is a comprehensive program covering the essentials to pursue various careers, including as an electrician, plumber, HVAC tech, carpenter, foreman, project manager, and construction site manager.
- **Cybersecurity**, focuses on the necessary skills to secure, protect, and identify vulnerabilities in a network, including various operating systems and network devices.
- Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS), prepares students with skills in mission planning, applications, maintenance, laws and regulations, data analytics, and project management using UAS platforms.





MCCCD is a primary source of higher education for Maricopa County residents and a supplier of trained workers to county industries, enhancing overall productivity in the county workforce. With an operating budget exceeding \$1 billion, the District continues to have an enormous impact. After graduation, the vast majority of its alumni remain in the county and, collectively with the District, infuse \$7.2 billion into the local economy.

Chancellor, Dr. Steven R. Gonzales

Dr. Steven R. Gonzales is the Chancellor of the Maricopa County Community College District, a role in which he has served since January 25, 2020. He brings nearly 25 years of instructional and administrative experience in higher education, serving previously as president of GateWay Community College for over eight years. Prior to GateWay, he served as the acting Associate Vice President of Academic Affairs and Chief Academic Officer for the Pinal County Community College District, which operates as Central Arizona College. Dr. Gonzales's past and present professional memberships, committees, and affiliations include the AACC Board of Directors; AACC Executive Board; AACC Commission on Academic, Student, and Community Engagement; National Community College Hispanic Council Executive Board Member; Community College Survey of Student Engagement Board of Directors; Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities; National Institute of Staff and Organizational Development; and Arizona Post-Secondary Education Board of Commissioners. He is also committed to community stewardship, serving on over a dozen committees, boards of directors, and councils. Dr. Gonzales earned his doctorate in educational administration in the top-ranked Community College Leadership Program from the University of Texas at Austin and holds a Master of Arts in teaching mathematics and a Bachelor of Science in secondary education- mathematics from Northern Arizona University.




Additionally, Maricopa Community Colleges' academic excellence has been accelerated by focusing on the skills and programs that local businesses need to remain competitive. Maricopa Community Colleges bolsters the economic output of Arizona's major industries, including tourism, aerospace, technology, and healthcare.

- Several of our colleges have been eligible to compete in The Aspen Institute College Excellence Program, the nation's signature recognition of high achievement and performance among America's community colleges. The eligible colleges include Chandler-Gilbert, Estrella Mountain, GateWay, Mesa, Paradise Valley, Phoenix, Scottsdale, and South Mountain.
- Maricopa County Community College District (MCCCD) has received accreditation approval from the Higher Learning Commission (HLC) for seven bachelor's degree programs launching in Fall 2023. MCCCD is the first community college in Arizona approved to offer bachelor's degree programs under the S.B. 1453 legislation and is working as a system to implement and sustain this new opportunity to serve our community.
- MCCCD is uniquely positioned throughout the state to develop strategic partnerships with local and national organizations including Apple, Adobe Systems Inc., State Farm, and Galvanize. MCCCD is a leader in regional workforce development, cultivating key partnerships with industry leaders, including Amazon, Boeing, Intel Corporation, and many more.
- MCCCD offers eight Arizona State Department of Education-approved certification pathways at the undergraduate and post-baccalaureate levels. All programs lead to Arizona teacher certification, preparing teachers for the classroom and assisting with the statewide teacher shortage.
- MCCCD is an Alliance Partner of Achieve60AZ, a statewide initiative working to ensure 60 percent of Arizonans obtain a post-secondary education by 2030.
- MCCCD has become a national leader in security, including cybersecurity, terrorism and public policy by building strategic partnerships with the National

Security Agency (NSA), the National Center of Academic Excellence (CAE) and industry leaders like Linux.

- In 2022, MCCCD partnered with the City of Phoenix to launch Route to Relief, a workforce development partnership that utilizes the City's federal pandemic relief dollars to provide free tuition, monthly stipends, and employment assistance to eligible students in programs across the system's ten colleges.
- In 2022, U.S. First Lady, Dr. Jill Biden, joined MCCCD and Intel Leaders to announce the System's new Semiconductor Technician Quick Start Program. The program has since garnered national attention, becoming a model for colleges and universities across the country.
- MCCCD received a \$499,987 grant from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation to support the development and implementation of ASSIST, a student success technology suite that produces user-friendly student data.MCCCD received \$1 million in federal Community Project Funding to further bioscience program development across the system's ten colleges.
- The first-of-its-kind artificial intelligence and machine learning degree and certificate program won the 2022 Innovator of the Year award in Academica during the 19th annual Governor's Celebration of Innovation Awards.
- Jessica McDonald, Phoenix College alumna, represented the U.S. in the 2019 World Cup Championship game and was inducted into the NJCAA Hall of Fame in 2022.
- Dr. Sian Proctor, a South Mountain Community College professor, joined a four-person crew for Inspiration4, the world's first all-civilian mission to space.

Leadership Opportunities for the Chief Information Officer

The CIO recommends IT policy at the highest level and is accountable for enterprise IT operational excellence and security; setting comprehensive goals for performance and growth; promoting and supporting an integrated and thriving organizational culture and vision; collaborating with college and other stakeholders; and coordinating with district and college executives. The successful candidate will lead the process of

determining the priorities, projects, and future directions of the District's IT functions to achieve maximum district-wide efficiencies and synergies and to adapt to continued technology change. This will include leading in the creation and support of services and processes that are inclusive, equitable, and accessible, as well as ensure a modern cyber-security program that incorporates current techniques and information and addresses risks and threats is in place. Thus, the CIO must bring a familiarity with higher education and emerging best practices and trends in technology, sustainability, security, and accessibility, as well as be adaptable and nimble to the ever-changing environment of these areas of responsibility.

Almost all functions in higher education are enabled by technology, whether teaching and learning, research, student support, facilities management, operations, or overall administration. The next CIO must be a collaborative leader who will work with their ITS leadership team to partner with other district divisions and the individual colleges to provide reliable, accessible, and secure enterprise systems and infrastructure. In doing so, the CIO is responsible for providing direction and leadership in the review of present IT systems and methods, and in the formation of new and revised systems that will position the ITS division to significantly improve the student experience across all colleges by providing student support through integrated processes and technology solutions.

The CIO will be responsible for preparing MCCCD for the future by extending and building upon key interdependencies of technology for the system and providing overall leadership for the direction, administration, and management of district-wide objectives.



This will include leading project management prioritization and driving the development and implementation of a district-wide IT strategic plan to ensure that ITS units within the District support the information technology needs of the individual colleges and their faculty, staff, and students. In addition to preparing long- and short-range goals and objectives related to strategic planning, the CIO will evaluate performance and progress toward the accomplishment of said goals and objectives, including monitoring workloads throughout the division and prioritizing staffing needs accordingly.

Serving as a catalyst for change, it is imperative that the next CIO has a deep understanding of industry standard administrative systems, networking, telephony and academic teaching and learning. The CIO will have the opportunity to review and analyze current technologyrelated purchases and upgrades to ensure that new applications and technologies are compatible with existing systems and are appropriately integrated into the District's enterprise architecture. In addition, the CIO will work collaboratively to identify IT service needs at the District as well as individual college level and their impact on system-wide resources and promote the efficient use of resources by developing appropriate standards and ensuring infrastructure costs are included in all information technology analyses.

The next CIO must be approachable and able to build relationships, garner trust, and motivate a diverse team of individuals. The successful candidate will provide energetic vision and develop a service-oriented culture, promoting open communication channels and enhancing relationships with stakeholders throughout the District, while being appreciative of the culture of each individual College within the District. The CIO will facilitate a work environment that encourages knowledge of, respect for, and development of skills and promotion of professional development so that ITS division staff remain competent and current in their field. The CIO also represents the District in information technology-related matters with federal and state agencies, corporate entities, and other institutions of higher education, and thus, a familiarity with Arizona and its governing bodies as well as the expenditure of funds is desirable.

Essential duties include but are not limited to:

- Building collaboration among the District's colleges and divisions to achieve the overall goals and objectives of MCCCD through the lens and framework of shared governance and establishing a long-term technology roadmap in alignment with system-wide efforts;
- Providing vision, strategic direction and planning, and coordination related to information technology integration and infrastructure across MCCCD;



- Providing guidance and counsel to the Chancellor and Chancellor's Executive Council in the examination and definition of objectives for existing and/or proposed information technology systems and the design of improved systems; making recommendations to promote innovation and ensure compliance;
- Monitoring the allocation of resources to seek economies of scale at a system level while maintaining quality of service and meeting the needs of learners across the system;
- Communicating and demonstrating return on investment (ROI) on capital information technology infrastructure expenditures;
- Managing departmental budget and capital investment proposals; proactively and strategically managing risks and containing costs related to information technology system operations;
- Overseeing resource strategies and managing and negotiating relationships, contracts, and services of IT-service providers, vendors, and other external entities, including accountability for all information technology assets and software licenses;



- Ensuring continuous delivery of IT services through oversight of service level agreements with end users and monitoring of IT systems performance;
- Collaborating and supporting the introduction of new technologies; contributing to continuous improvements in client service experiences and management of critical projects and programs; identifying and presenting innovative information technology opportunities that improve operations, reduce cost, and increase operational efficiency;
- Ensuring the development of policies, procedures, priorities, and technical standards related to information technology, including security and accessibility;

- Leading and managing a comprehensive team of information technology experts; developing an environment for employees to reach their full potential; supporting professional development and employee engagement of the ITS team and its units;
- Overseeing the assessment, preparation, and delivery of information technology training to MCCCD faculty, staff, and students to introduce them to new technologies and/or improve use of existing technologies;
- Working with the Chief Operating Officer and Chancellor's Executive Council to report to and advise the Governing Board on strategic initiatives, outcomes, and measurements related to information technology services.

Minimum Qualifications

- Master's Degree from a regionally accredited institution in education, business, finance, computer science, management information systems, or related Discipline;
- 8 years' experience with a minimum of five (5) years of progressively responsible, technical leadership experience and demonstrated professional achievement in Information Technology with a commitment to academic excellence, collaboration, shared governance, efficiency and effectiveness, and three (3) years of supervisory experience. Management/ leadership experience includes: Program management, project management, budget development and management related to programs or projects, staff supervision, policy development, administration, evaluation and compliance.

- Track record of successfully planning and delivering complex information technology services and projects in a large, multi-facility organization, preferably in higher education.
- Experience leading and implementing information technology transformation through a comprehensive shared governance process with vision, strategy, and excellent judgment.

- Capacity to perform complex tasks and prioritize multiple and sometimes competing priorities, including advanced project management and problem-solving skills.
- Experience implementing innovative technology and organizational change strategies to enhance processes and improve the end-user experience.
- Understanding of current and emerging information technology services, library services platforms including learning management and student information systems, financial systems, human resource management and procurement systems, CRMs, and other software applications, infrastructure, enterprises, help desk and network Technologies.
- Awareness of key issues and trends in broad areas of technology, including infrastructure, cloud services, data management, digital engagement, and AI.
- Experience implementing and maintaining data security and privacy strategies.
- Understanding of compliance requirements and demonstrated experience ensuring accessibility and usability by individuals for IT services.
